Background

The Interurban Trail was once a highly successful and colorful electric railway that ran between Seattle and Tacoma during the early years of this century. It originated in 1901 as the Seattle-Tacoma Interurban Railroad serving Georgetown, Tacoma, the White River Valley, and the towns of Kent, Renton, and Auburn.

From the outset it showed a profit. However, with the arrival of the automobile, the railroad lost popularity, declared bankruptcy in 1928, and was sold to Puget Sound Power and Light Company (PSPL).

During recent years, bicycle groups, joggers, hikers, and horseback riders have been increasingly aware of the need for recreational facilities through the Green River Valley.

In response to that interest, King County and PSPL signed an agreement granting a long-term recreational easement along 16 miles of the former railway. In 1977 the County and the six valley cities entered into an agreement for development, maintenance and administration of the Interurban Trail.

Over the years funds have been made available from the Federal Highway Administration, Bicycle Demonstration Grant and local Community Block for construction.

In the future, it is anticipated that the paved trail will extend through the full 16 miles from Fort Dent Park in Tukwila to the Pierce County line. This trail will serve as the backbone for a bicycle trail system in the Green River Valley.
